Kia ora koutou kotoa

Like many we are excited to be at Level 1 and the continued move to an ever more "normal" looking school day. There aren't too many changes for our school as we move down a level.

Under Level 1, while our QR codes remain up for those that wish to use them, we can say goodbye to social distancing and the school contact registers at the gates. Visitors to the school can return to signing our register at the front office which remains an important part of health and safety as always. We will continue to encourage good hand hygiene, and for now, the hand sanitise dispensers around the school will remain well-stocked. We will also keep up our additional cleaning of high contact surfaces such as door handles and alike. Level 1 will see the welcome return of whole school assemblies, and later we hope, Cluster events such as cross country and Top Team. One important reminder is for parents and caregivers to keep any unwell children at home, something that will help assist in holding the spread of those winter bugs as they start to raise their heads.

The Rai Way Student Shop was launched this week and is already very popular with students. After consultation with pupils of all ages earlier in the year, it was decided to revamp our PB4L rewards systems providing students with more freedom of choice and immediacy in how they were rewarded. Students can now "spend" their stamps on a range of options in the Rai Way Shop including stationery, some food items, and vouchers. Rewards are already flying out the door for students who have earned them over the last term and a half. Our senior NCEA students seem pleased with the consideration that has been given the impacts of COVID 19 on study and learning. Consequently, students can be allocated a maximum of up to 10 extra credits at Level 1, and 8 at Level 2 & 3 to help compensate for the time lost. These will be known as LR credits (or Learning Recognition Credits) and if applicable, will be added on at the end of the academic year. Levels for overall endorsements have also been lessened from 50 to 46 credits at Merit or Excellence. Subject endorsements have likewise been adjusted from 14 to 12 credits at Merit or Excellence. Hopefully this helps take away some of the anxiety students might feel around the time spent under lockdown.

Finally, post lockdown we have had renewed in interest in BYOD devices. As a reminder, students need a signed BYOD form in order to bring a phone or laptop to school. These can be picked up from me and I advise parents and caregivers take some time to go through the form with their young people to ensure they understand the expectations and responsibilities of having a device at school. These devices can be wonderful servants, and terrible masters and we have dual interest in their safe and effective use in our school.



#### New Marketing Campaign Dunedin

Malcolm Anderson, the council's marketing manager, said the campaign was pitched at those who could no longer go overseas due to COVID-19 restrictions and aimed to show them that Dunedin could offer pretty much the same thing.

Malcolm Anderson said the compact city had plenty of destinations that international tourists raved about. He had hoped Kiwis' perspective would be changed by the video campaign. It also encourages Dunedinites to visit local attractions with a new app offering special offers and promo deals!

In early June Russia's president Vladimir Putin declared a state of emergency due to 20,000 tonnes of diesel oil that leaked into a river within the arctic circle.

The spill happened when a fuel tank at the power plant near the city of Norilsk collapsed. The power plant director (Vyacheslav Starostin) has been taken into custody until 31 July.

The oil drifted 12 kilometres from the site where it leaked. President Putin expressed his anger after discovering officials learned about the oil spill days later. Experts said it could take years to fully recover.

The oil spill is going to cost \$130 million to clean up according to an early estimate. Last time Siberia had a huge oil spill was in 1999 and that took years to recover.

#### Covid-19

Fifteen percent of people infected with Covid-19 didn't have symptoms. The most common symptoms for Covid-19 are fever, dry cough, and tiredness. Serious symptoms of Covid-19 are difficulty breathing or shortness of breath, chest pain, and loss of speech or movement.

There are 1,154 confirmed cases, 1131 received cases, and 22 deaths in New Zealand. It has now been 16 days since a new Covid-19 case was reported in New Zealand.

The main people at risk for Covid-19 are older people who are 70 and above and people who have medical conditions, but overall everyone can get Covid-19.

#### Coca-Cola

Coca-Cola was popularised by an American serviceman in New Zealand during world war 2 (1 September 1939 - 2 September 1945). It was imported ready-made from 1939, and made locally from imported concentrate after 1944. In the early 2000's factories in Auckland and Christchurch could produce over 3 million litres of soft drink a day.

The Coca-Cola company is a publicly listed company, meaning there is not one sole owner but rather the company is "owned" by thousands of shareholders and investors around the world. The largest share owner of the company is an American businessman, Warren Buffett.

New Zealand's sales in NARTD (Non Alcoholic Ready To Drink) volumes also showed improvement with declines improving from a 35% drop in April to just 10% in the first three weeks of May. The firm is aware that it is not out of the Covid-19 woods yet despite things looking up.
