#### A Note from the Board

#### Bringing you relevant news from our monthly meetings

Curious about how the school spends money? Where does the funding come from? How does the school prioritize where it is spent?

Schools have a very complex way of being funded from the Ministry of Education (MoE). The easiest way to explain it is to talk about different "pots" of money. The school receives many different pots of money – for example one for teaching staff, one for teacher aides, one for long term maintenance, etc etc. These pots are not interchangeable – the teachers can't be paid out of the long term maintenance pot. These pots also must be fully spent within one year, or the money is taken back out of these pots by the MoE. The one pot of money we have more control over is the Operations pot – for things like power bills, administration, and day to day maintenance. If we make savings in these areas – for example by installing funded solar panels - we can keep the extra and place it in our reserves. Along with these regular pots, there is a special pot for emergency health and safety – if the MoE thinks something is serious enough they may give the school additional money for a special project.

Each year Management creates a budget within these pots – and it is supported by the Board and reported back to the Board every meeting.

Staffing is calculated on how many children are enrolled. Although we have been asked before why we don't have more teachers, this is governed very tightly by the MoE. Teacher Aide hours are funded by how many children qualify for them – by being diagnosed as needing extra help.

In addition to the regular and emergency MoE pots of money, Rai Valley Area School has another special pot of money. This is called the Board Funds and is managed by the Board of Trustees. This is money is not supplied by the MoE and therefore not controlled by them. Although many schools run at a loss and are in debt, we at RVAS are running with a surplus from money we have saved from previous years. This allows us to spend money on extras for our children that we wouldn't normally have access to. For example, our school only qualifies for MoE funding for one teacher aide, but the Board has chosen to fund three extra teacher aides out of our surplus. This year, we have also employed an extra part time teacher out of our reserves. This money also allows us discretionary spending such as Education Outside of the Classroom (EOTC) – field trips and extra activities (more on this next newsletter!).

The school can also receive extra money by applying for grants for different projects – for example the playground climbing frame was partly funded by a grant from the Marlborough District Council, and partly by reserve funds. The new solar panels were funded mostly through an MoE Sustainability Fund, and a small part by the reserve funds.

#### Some recent examples of "pots" of money expenditure:

- Our new deck which will also get a verandah roof and dropdowns next term was approved and paid for by the MoE from the Emergency Health and Safety pot. This was to enable staff and students with physical mobility limitations to safely get around the school without getting wet. This money could not be spent elsewhere.
- · Later this year we will embark on a large modernization project of the Junior classrooms. It will involve gutting the area and redesigning the rooms. This funding comes out of the "Long term property maintenance" pot and cannot be used for any other category. It will also be taken away from the school if we do not use it within a given time period.
- · We have just had "School Investment Package" funding approved. This is given every five years and is for "nice to have" projects such as footpaths, fences, and sporting additions. As a Board we have chosen to use these funds to resurface the courts with Plexipave and have a skate ramp built for the older children. Again, this funding cannot be used for any other purpose (e.g., teachers, teacher aides, buildings); and if it is not spent within the given timeframe it is taken back.

We hope this has shed some light on the funding and spending process and answered some queries. You are welcome to approach any Board of Trustee member with any questions – all our emails are listed on the school website. The School Board of Trustees meet regularly – about twice a term. These meetings are not public meetings, but they are "open to the public." This means that even if you're not a member, you are welcome to attend as an observer although you may not have speaking rights. We would love to see you there; our next meetings are:

The Rai Valley Leos are beginning a project of knitting garments: singlets, hats and bootees for premature babies for local hospitals.


We would be very grateful for donations of wool suitable for knitting baby clothes and also knitting needles.


