Students study future of mussels

Will rising sea temperatures affect how mussels eat? Does the acidity of the water affect how quickly mussels grow? These are some of the questions that Year 13 students from across the district had the opportunity to explore last week.

A partnership between Cawthron, Otago University and NMIT saw a university marine scientist spend two weeks investigating the molluscs with different groups of high school students from Marlborough and Nelson.

Rai Valley Area School and Kaikōura High School each sent small groups of students to the Cawthron Aquaculture Park in Nelson last week.

As part of a Level 3 achievement standard, students had to carry out a biological investigation.

Update for Community Oral Health Service

We hope this finds all our school communities doing well as things continue to change around us all.

Many of you may be aware that there have been significant disruptions to the Community Oral Health Service in recent years. COVID19 has unsurprisingly had the biggest impact. Lockdowns resulted in all but 'Relief of Pain' services being available and there are ongoing limitations to service to manage the COVID19 risks for the whanau/families and our staff in the confined, close-up clinic settings.

A number of other factors are having an increasing impact of the timeliness on Oral Health Care for the tamariki/children of Nelson/Marlborough. Most recently staff illnesses have added to the impact of COVID19. In addition, we are also experiencing an unprecedented shortage of Dental and Oral Health Therapists. We are working secure more therapists however this is challenging in a period of a national shortage of trained oral health professionals.

A number of strategies are in place to make the most of opportunities available to us to keep wait times for tamariki/children to a minimum. This includes changes to the mobile clinic calendar for site visits to rural areas, recommencement of some Saturday clinics and early discharge from the service. More details below.

Mobile Clinics

The Wairau mobile has been off road for repairs and a COVID19 upgrade since late 2021 and unfortunately we still await parts for the repair. The Nelson area mobile continues to operate but at reduced capacity.

We've prioritised outlying areas for the mobile service where access to town clinics is the most difficult. All whanau/families will be contacted by the nearest hub and alternative clinic appointments will be offered. We'll endeavour to work with whanau/families from outlying areas to find a time that coincides with trips to town centres.

Our usual annual calendar is now changing frequently so we will endeavour to remain in contact with schools as the plan evolves. Please don't hesitate to contact us with any concerns in regard to the mobile service.

Early Discharge Year 7 & 8 children

A large number of private dentists have generously agreed to take over the care of Year 7 & 8 children instead of the usual transfer to private dentists at Year 9.

Our clinics will be in touch with families as appointments come due (or are overdue) to make arrangements for those who wish to take up this option. Please work with your Community Oral Health Hub in the first instance to get this arrangement underway.

Saturday Clinics

Some of our team have kindly offered their time on Saturdays as an option for appointments. This is a very limited service and will be offered where it is available.

Urgent Care

As is our normal practice if your child has urgent needs please be in touch with your nearest clinic to make arrangement for an urgent appointment or contact Nelson or Wairau hospitals for dental afterhours information.









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
