

Congratulations to our NCEA Students from 2022. Every student who completed the academic year has achieved their NCEA at their level. A special congratulations to Electra Maisey who gained an endorsement with Excellence at Level 3 and Lewis Hill who gained a Merit endorsement at Level 3.

Some of you may have noticed the adjustment to our secondary school timetable. This year we are running a 5period day timetable. This is more in line with a number of secondary schools but also gives more time for some of our practical classes for example physical education and science. As a result, we have moved our start time by 5 minutes, to 8.45 am.

Last year we announced that we had been invited to join the lunches in school. There is a lot of behind-the-scenes paperwork for this but we hope to be providing lunches by the beginning of Term 2.

This year we are focussing on widening the opportunity for our students to participate in school trips and camps. There are a number of camps and trips being planned for Years 5 and above. The Years 11-13 camp will be in Christchurch at the beginning of Term 3. Once again we are looking at increasing the opportunities we offer our students for sports. Finally, as a number of you are aware there is a drive to increase student attendance across New Zealand. As a school, our attendance was better than a number of other schools but it was still below 90%. This year we are hoping to have an attendance rate of 95% or better. This means no more than 2.5 days per term. We are hoping for your support with this challenge.

BUS STUDENTS & CAREGIVERS.

Welcome back to the new year everyone. A bit wet still and roads can be slippery. We have some new students requiring bus travel, so we want them to have timings and pick-up spots correct. The timings for this bus route should still be the same, maybe just a few minutes later as this big bus navigates the Wakamarina Road slower.

If you have any queries, please contact me. We will be sorting some senior students to be bus monitors on each bus to help with managing behaviour and any other issues that arise during travel.

Students need to get to the bus lines promptly when the bell rings at 2.50pm, so as not to keep people waiting. Junior students need to remember that they must have their shoes on as well.

Information from GO Bus

"Caregivers are responsible for getting their children to school, which may involve getting the children to and from their nearest bus pick-up and drop-off location. Please either stay with your children while they are waiting for their school transport in the morning or keep in contact with them to make sure that they are picked up safely. It is recommended students and caregivers be at the bus pickup/drop-off locations 5 to 10 minutes before the bus is scheduled to arrive".


We had a great holiday, even though we didn't get any pigs or deer!

Attendance and Punctuality - 2023

Did you know?

If your child misses 1 day a week:

= 40 days a year or 8 weeks per year or 2 1/2 years missed by Year 13.

If your child misses 2 days a week

= 80 days per year or 16 weeks a year or over 5 years missed by Year 13.

If your child misses 10 minutes late per day

= 50 minutes a week or 1 1/2 weeks per year.

If your child misses 1 hour late per day

= 1 day a week = 8 weeks a year or 2 1/2 years missed by Year 13.

Attendance and punctuality really does matter!

Reminders:

- If late, please sign in at the office, and if leaving the school site, please sign out, in case of an emergency. We need to know your child's whereabouts as it is a Health and Safety issue.
- Please contact the school office by phone (03 5716 016), email (office@rai.co.nz), or in person, with the *specific* reason for the absence.
 We need the reason for the codes that we report to the Ministry of Education.

If we don't hear, we will do a follow-up call or may do a home visit to make sure everything is OK. A 'T' will be the code used until we receive the reason for your child's absence -

A 'T' will be the code used until we receive the reason for your child's absence -Truant.

 Please provide a sick note from the Doctor, if your child is absent for three days or more. This is again important for the Ministry reporting.

Many thanks for your support this year in trying to boost attendance for our students which will then lead to improved learning for your child.



You may spot a helicopter spraying willows and weeds this month (February), on land between SH6 and the Pelorus River near Canvastown.

The aerial spraying by Marlborough Helicopters is part of a Ngāti Kuia project to restore Ruapaka Wetland to its original state. The method was chosen because it accurately targets weeds and enables immediate progress. Areas of open water, culturally significant sites, native vegetation can be avoided.

Already this summer a ground-based team from Native Restorations Ltd has been hand-drilling large trees then injecting them with herbicide and cutting and pasting saplings and branches. They also targeted old man's beard and convolvulus vines, broom, hawthorn and introduced grasses.

A Ngāti Kuia horticulture crew of nine have been approved to do follow-up work including planting, after completing a Level 3 Certificate in Horticulture. Seedlings are being grown in a Ngāti Kuia nursery at Titiraukawa near Pelorus Bridge.
