

Secondary News



Kia ora koutou,

What a great last few weeks we have had here at Rai Valley, with the weather being just about as perfect as it could have been for the cross country. We have also had students getting involved in a wide range of activities ranging from EPro8 technology competitions, through to Spirit of Adventure, completing Duke of Edinburgh, as well as Maths week and our Year 10 cohort receiving their Common Assessment (Literacy and Numeracy) Grades.

I would like to extend my thanks to Jared and Erin for allowing us to use their paddocks to push the boundaries of last week's cross country. Thanks to their generosity we were able to go beyond the school fields, their support was very much appreciated by all.

It is with genuine pride that I can say that we had 100% participation, with the majority of students running or walking the course, and those who did not run or walk the course volunteered to marshal the event, providing not just direction, but also encouragement to those who were taking part. It resulted in a very competitive event and certainly gives us something to build upon and develop even further next year (who knows perhaps we will add some obstacles and other surprises).

Academically we have some very strong results for the Level 1 Literacy Common Assessments, achieving above the national average in a number of areas. These tests are a relatively new initiative designed to build consistency across Aotearoa New Zealand, especially around setting a benchmark for how literacy (reading and writing) and numeracy skills are quantified. For those students who did not quite achieve, the next opportunity is literally just around the corner (week beginning 16th September) and we are already working towards providing them with the opportunities and skills to give it another go.

We will also be running our Derived Grade Examinations for our year 11-13 students in the same week. Derived Grade exams are an incredibly important time for our students because they provide a realistic indication of how our akonga will do at the end of the year. They also contribute towards providing grades in the event of a student being unable to attend the formal exam at the end of the year (due to a variety of reasons). These exams are a formal part of our assessment structure, and students are expected to attend all sessions (there will not be dedicated study leave for these as they will run as part of the normal school day). With this in mind it is vitally important that our students are provided with the time and space after school to revise, practice and consolidate their learning so they are as prepared as they can be for these important moments.

Planning for the Year 9/10 camp is now under way. We will once again be teaming up with Tapawera Area School. We are currently finalising the timetable of activities and have locked in overnight camping excursions for both the Year 9s (lake level) and Year 10s (backcountry). Keep an eye out over the next few weeks for equipment lists and requests.

Once again thank you for all your support this term.

SCHOLASTIC BOOK FAIR STARTS IN 1 WEEK




There will be an Enchanted Forest Dress Up day for Primary on Wednesday 28th August. Come dressed as a magical book character or any enchanted forest creature.



GROUND BASED RODENT CONTROL - POISON WARNING

Vector Free Marlborough wishes to advise that a ground-based rodent control operation will be taking place to significantly reduce rodent numbers on Tawhitinui and Awaiti Islands. It is important that we reduce rodent numbers, as we work towards eradicating pests from the islands over the long term.

Description of control area

Tennyson Inlet Islands: Tawhitinui Island (22ha) and Awaiti Island (4ha) are located 2.5km east of Elaine Bay in the Marlborough Sounds and form part of the Tennyson Inlet islands group, which also includes Tarakaipā Island (not in the control operation) further south and east of Penzance Bay.

Operation date

From 14 August 2024

Poisoning methods, poison used and nature of poison

 Double Tap Pellet Bait containing Diphacinone 0.05g/kg and Cholecalciferol 0.6 g/kg in the form of a dyed green pellet bait, contained inside reusable Philproof bait stations attached to trees 100cm above the ground

General warning

The public are reminded of the danger that toxic baits pose, particularly to children and dogs.

- Follow advice stated on poison warning signs
- Do not touch poison baits or bait stations
- Do not touch poisoned rodent carcasses
- Keep children under strict supervision in the control area
- Do not let dogs eat poisoned carcasses

Warning signs will be erected at all main public entry points and the public are reminded that it is an offence to remove any of these signs. Please follow the instructions stated on the signs.




