Tumuaki's Report con't



Our School Board of Trustees continues to work hard behind the scenes. Earlier this year they finalized the strategic plan for 2024 and 2025. As well as focussing on continued academic improvement, they also prioritised the growth of extracurricular activities including school camps, sports, and cultural events.

This year our students have participated in a wide range of sporting events. A recent survey for Sport Tasman showed that 55% of our students in Years 9-13 had represented our school in sports and 58% of girls.

Their continued funding to employ additional Teacher Aide hours is valued and makes a difference in student achievement.

2025 will see the introduction of Structured Literacy for Years 1-6 and the new Mathematics Curriculum for Years 1-8. In addition, there will be further changes to NCEA Level 1.

Attendance continues to remain a government focus, currently, schools report their attendance to the Ministry weekly, and in 2025 it will be daily reporting. There are also changes in attendance codes that we will share with you in the new year.

A huge thank you to all of our staff for their dedication and their commitment to our students and our school and personally for your support and patience during the year,

May you have a very happy Christmas, a wonderful New Year, and a safe and relaxing holiday period. I look forward to seeing you all in 2025. Kia ora koutou Maree





Primary News



Kia ora tatou,

That's it, it is done (almost)... we managed to get through 2024, congratulations. I hope your 2024 has been as enjoyable as mine. It has been just about a year since my whanau moved to Rai Valley and in this time we have found the students, staff and wider community to not only be accommodating and welcoming, but also resilient, generous and willing to go the extra mile for our tamariki.

It was my genuine privilege to "MC" Prize Giving last night and be able to witness and share in the success that all our students richly deserve. Hopefully somewhere within this newsletter is a list of all the winners (there were many many of you), which is a testament to not only the hard work of the staff but also the students themselves.

I was reflecting on all the extra curricular opportunities we have offered our students this year which have included- Two Spirit of Adventure opportunities, touch rugby, tournament weeks (Top of South and National), ki-o-rahi-Year 9/10 camp to Lake Rotoiti, bricks in schools, Matariki festival, Hauora day, Kaitiaki club (in conduction with the Te Hoiere project), opening of the village green, netball, lit quiz, Maud Island, Defensive driving, Ryda road safety, cross country, supreme team, Kiwi-can, Makos, Epro 8 challenge, Speeches and the Year 5-8 camp to Pine Valley. As you can see we have been kept very busy.

Academically we have also seen very encouraging results from many of our students, particularly at Senior level. Our Year 10 cohort all attempted some of the Literacy and Numeracy Co-Requisites, with the majority of them gaining passes.... this is extremely encouraging and when we look at the data we are above the national average in this regard. Our Year 11 cohort once again were the test-bed for new educational initiatives, as the first cohort to go through the "revised' level 1 standards. As I mentioned at prize-giving, this cohort in particular has had to be especially resilient as the "goal posts" for many of these assessments were literally moved around them. My hat goes off to them for staying the course and not giving up.

There are more changes coming next year across the curriculum, and we as staff are already deep into preparing for 2025, the first newsletter of 2025 will provide you with updates on what will be on the horizon.

Last night we "farewelled" our four Year 13 students, but just as importantly three of our Year 12 students who spent their entire educational career at Rai Valley (12 Years!!). Our "leavers" or 'graduates" all received pounamu pendants which I hope will become as special for them as their time with us has been.

To Zoe, Skyla, Kirrilee, Ella D, Dylan, Ella J and Kayla , I wish you the very very best for your future, you should be very proud of all that you have achieved and we send you off into the big wild world under the condition that you always feel welcomed back- we look meeting you again.

I will close 2024 for myself with the whakataukī I read last night which I feel is relevant to all. "Ko te pae tawhiti whāia kia tata, ko te pae tata whakamaua kia tina" Seek out the distant horizons and cherish those you have attained




Year 9's learning about Geometry

We are currently updating The RAI Way programme and you may have. noticed some subtle changes as we update and publish new resources. Kaiako (teachers) have been involved in professional development and have engaged with kaiako from other local PB4L kura, sharing ideas and their knowledge on how to improve our own system.

We have new posters around our kura, with an emphasis on The RAI Way kura values. In a recent audit our students were able to recall the values of:

Tamariki can exchange their points for a small reward, or keep the points until they collect enough for a bigger reward such as gift card from a shop of their choice (eg Paperplus). Prizes range from art supplies, sports and cultural items, beauty and body care products, free time and a selection of food, which is always popular with the seniors.
