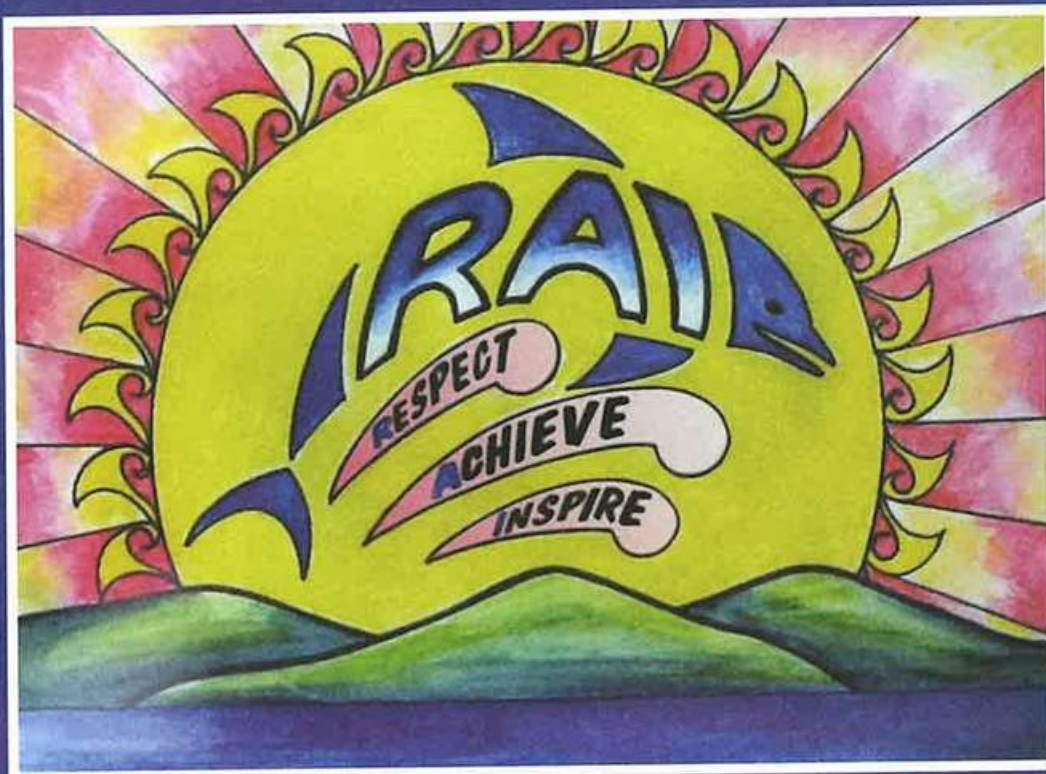

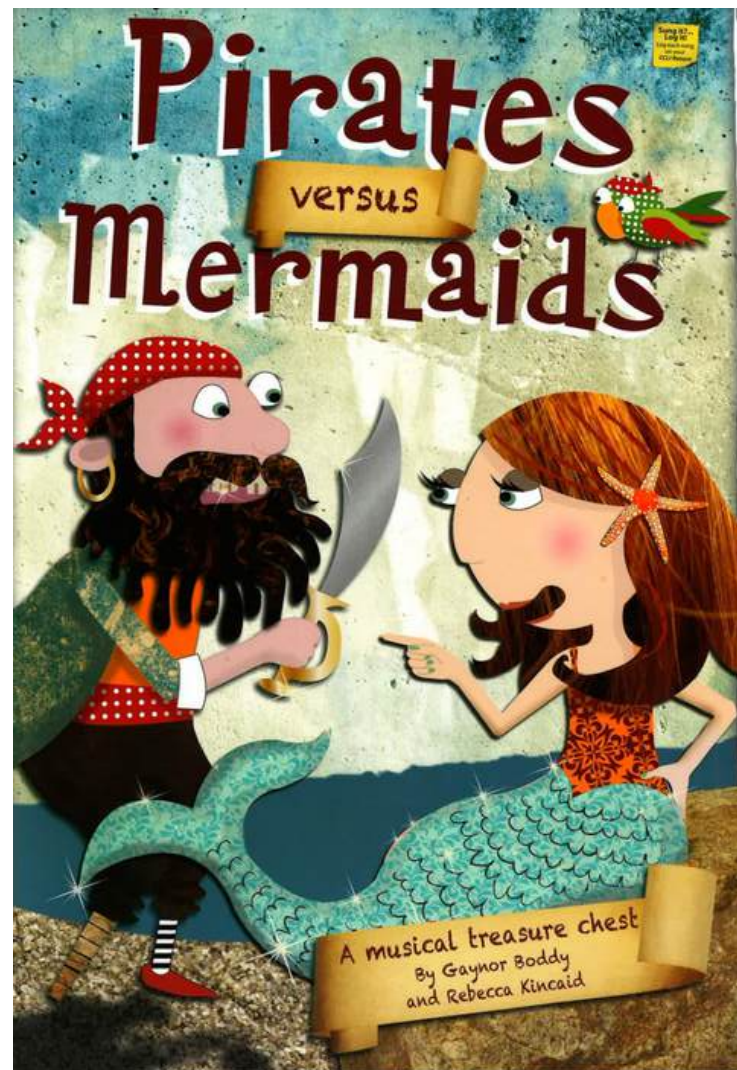
Kiwi Can will resume on the first Friday back, then Sam Baxter will come on the following week and continue alternate weeks with Kiwi Can.

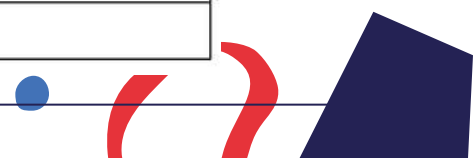
All eight students will be travelling to Rangiora next month to trial for a place at Nationals.

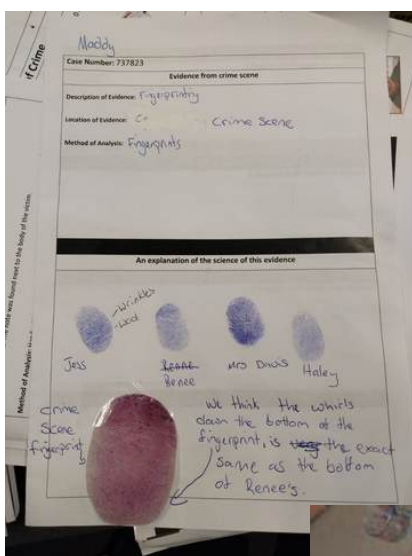
Year 7-10 Students Turn Detective in Forensic Science Week!

Rai Valley School immersed in Te Hoiere

Rai Valley School's kaitiaki group immersed themselves in all things Te Hoiere with a snorkel trip at Pelorus Bridge recently. Children, parents and teachers joined with Tasman Bay Guardians for freshwater activities in the morning followed by a float down the awa in the afternoon. The day was largely funded through the Department of Conservation's Ngā Awa River Restoration Programme.



In our Year 11 Vocational Pathways class, we had to plan a fun event for the primary children. It was our first assessment and the purpose of this task was for us to work as a team. We had to use effective, positive communication to plan, organise and set up the event. It took several periods to complete our plan. 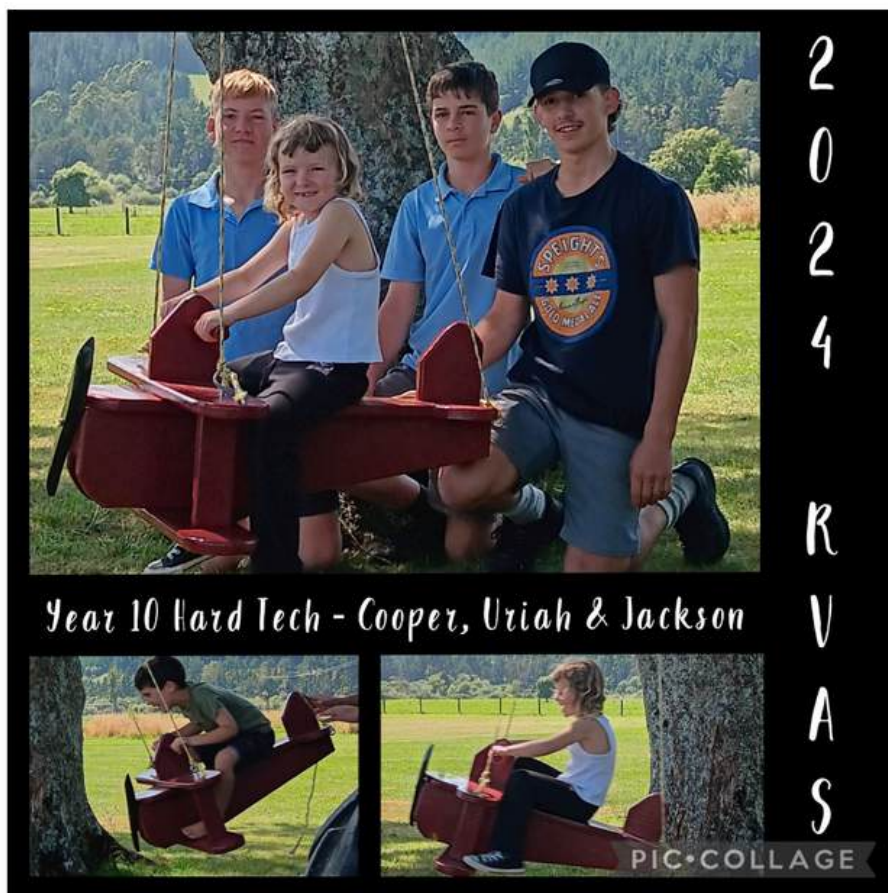

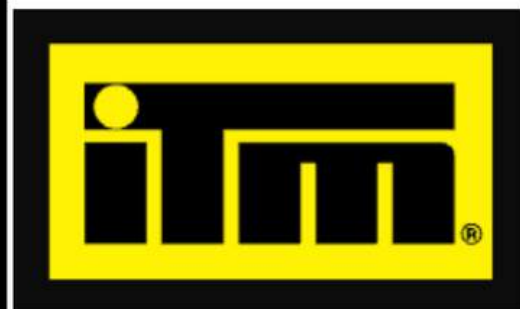

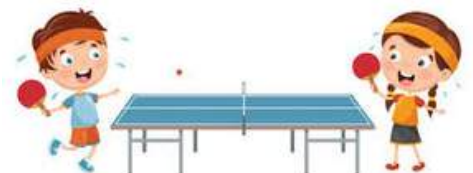
