There are 2 upcoming teacher only days in term 4. The year's 1-8 students will have a Teacher Only Day on Friday 28th November to focus on the new mathematics curriculum, while the year 9 and 10's are at camp. The Year 9 and 10 Teacher Only Day will be the 10th December and this will be a day where secondary teachers in Nelson Marlborough get together to work on the new Curriculum.

Recently, you will have read about various industrial actions by teachers and principals. To date this has not included teachers who are covered by the Area Schools contract. Secondary News

Kia ora,

Term 3 has finally decided that enough is enough and has moved on its way. Term 4 has yet to emerge from its yearly slumber, but there are definitely signs it is stirring and preparing to open its academic eyes in anticipation of what is to come.

Depending on when this newsletter is published, the seniors may still be on camp, returning from camp, or already back—safe, (hopefully) exhausted, and thoroughly "big-citied out". If all has gone to plan, we have been to Weta Workshop, strolled around the precincts of Wellington, sampled what university life is like, shared a pizza or two, worked out who is a werewolf, and visited Te Papa.

The end of Term 3 for our students in Years 11–13 is a significant milestone (for our year 13s even more so), as it signals the closing—for most—of their internal assessments (work assessed in class that contributes to NCEA credits). The focus now shifts to externals (exams) and the rigours and challenges these assessments will bring.

Traditionally, students in Years 11–13 go on "exam" or "study" leave at the end of Week 4. This is when they will be revising madly, emailing teachers for last-minute guidance and advice, and memorising the exam timetable to ensure they know the when and where of their exams. It is important to note that exam leave is not a guarantee, nor is it a "break". It is an invaluable time for students to consolidate their learning.

To be signed off for exam leave, students must have met several criteria. The most significant is that Ms Furness and I have had a conversation with them about the number of credits they have already earned. Students will not be signed off unless they have secured at least 60 credits at their year level (NCEA Level 1, 2, or 3). Those who are short will be expected to remain at school, completing any remaining assessments contributing to their success, and of course attending their external examinations. If you require clarification, or if your child is unsure, please feel free to contact me—I will be glad to provide guidance.

A number of students have also just completed the second round of CAAs (Common Assessment Activities). The results are expected to be published within the next few weeks. I am sure that further on in the newsletter there will be details about the wonderful show Pirates and Mermaids, which was performed so spectacularly last week. It was fantastic to see so many of you in attendance, but more importantly, it was a privilege to see our students shine so brilliantly on stage. Kā rawe to all involved.

On that note—stay safe, thank you once again for your support, and enjoy the beautiful spring days.



Notice of Asbestos Removal Work

To Whom It May Concern,

Scope Group, a licensed Asbestos Removalist (WorkSafe Class **A** Licence: number **RA16080091** will be undertaking removal work of some Asbestos Containing Materials (ACMs) from Rai Valley School.

This removal work will be conducted between the hours of 7AM to 7PM on 22 September 2025 and is expected to finish by 03 October 2025.

WorkSafe NZ was notified on 4 September 2025 that this licensed asbestos removal work is to be undertaken.

Rai Valley School management and board of trustees have been consulted about the nature and timing of this work, together with the safety measures to be used.

The following safety measures will be put in place and maintained for the duration of this project:

- Signs, barriers and/or temporary fencing will be installed.
- PVA solution or water will be applied to asbestos containing materials to prevent airborne asbestos fibres dust (as required).
- Asbestos containing materials will not be broken, where possible.
- Plastic will be used to cover horizontal surfaces and surrounds.
- Asbestos containing material will be wrapped on site and disposed of at an approved tip site
- Air monitoring at the work site boundary will be place for the duration of the work. If asbestos
 fibres above the allowable safe limit are detected, work will cease immediately, and corrective
 measures applied
- An independent party will carry out an inspection of the site on completion of the work, and issue a clearance certificate.

The Ministry of Education website has further information about the management of asbestos and procedures to ensure the safety of all involved in or affected by the work, at the school and community. 

Safety for Students is important

Screen Time and Brain Development – What Parents Should Know

Screen time in children, particularly during their early years, can have a significant impact on their brain development and behaviour. While some screen content can offer educational benefits, excessive or unsupervised screen time may negatively affect cognitive and social-emotional skills.

Babies and Toddlers (0-5 years):

Too much screen time at this age can slow down how children learn to talk and think. It can also make it harder for them to pay attention, manage their emotions, and solve simple problems. Children need real-world play and human interaction for healthy brain growth.

Preschoolers (3-5 years):

Lots of screen time at this age may affect parts of the brain that help children develop memory, empathy, and staying focused. They still learn best by doing things, not just watching.

Older Children and Teens:

As children grow, screen time becomes a bigger part of life—school, socialising, and entertainment often happen on devices. But too much screen time over time can impact how the brain develops, especially in areas that help with communication skills, managing emotions, relationships, and making decisions.

When screen use starts to take over daily life—interfering with sleep, physical activity, school, and family time—it can become a real problem. Some signs of unhealthy screen use include:

- Mood swings or aggression when devices are taken away
- Spending more time online than with real-life friends and family members
- · Being exposed to violent or inappropriate content
- Skipping meals, activities, or homework to stay on a device

In New Zealand and around the world, more children and teens are showing signs of screen dependency—where they feel they can't cope without their devices. This can affect mental health, increase anxiety or loneliness, and lead to behavioural issues.

How Screen Time Affects Learning and Thinking

Focus and Attention:



When children are glued to screens, their brains get a lot of fast-moving input. This can make it harder for them to concentrate during quiet, slower-paced activities like reading or schoolwork.

Talking and Language Skills:



Face-to-face chats help children learn new words and how conversations work. If screen time replaces these interactions, children might take longer to develop language skills.

Thinking and Problem-Solving:



Children who spend lots of time on screens might struggle more with planning, self-control, and thinking creatively.

Empathy and Social Skills:



Children learn to read emotions and respond kindly by spending time with others. Too much solo screen time means fewer chances to build these important skills.

Behaviour and Mood:



Lots of screen time can sometimes lead to more tantrums, fussiness, or trouble managing big feelings—especially if screen time becomes a way to avoid boredom or tough emotions.

This is to let you know that removal of wind fallen trees adjacent to State Highway 6 Spooners

Road users will need to travel via the detour route. Please allow an additional 10 minutes to your travelling time.

Emergency services will always be accommodated.




