### Tumuaki's Report continued

This is another great opportunity for our students to mix with children from other schools and work together.

Our school prizegiving will be held on Thursday 11th December at 6.30pm. Hopefully it will be a fine evening and we will be able to hold it outside. If not it will be in the hall, everyone is welcome to come along. The last day of term is Friday 12th December.

In the middle of the year the school received its allocation of 5 Year property money. After repairs and maintenance, this allocation will be spent in two key areas, upgrading the decking in the primary and hall areas, as well modernising the school toilets. We hope that some of the work will begin during the Christmas break.

Attendance continues to be a national focus. Our attendance stats for term 2 and 3 were a concern but explainable with the outbreak of whooping cough in term 2 and flu in term 3. Family holidays continue to impact our overall figures. The Ministry requires the Board of Trustees to have an attendance plan that will be implemented at the beginning of Term 1 2026.

Kia ora,

The seniors have now been on study leave for several weeks, and the school feels noticeably quieter — a change that brings both its benefits and its challenges. On one hand, our "senior" Year 10s have a chance to take a little more ownership of the school; on the other, the duty teacher now needs to explore every corner of the grounds, as hide-and-seek suddenly seems far easier to pull off.

So far, the exams appear to have gone very well. I've caught up with a number of students, and the general feeling coming out of each exam is positive. Many have said they felt well prepared, which is reassuring for us as teachers.

As we move into the final weeks of the term and enjoy the steadier weather and warmer days, the school is shifting into summer mode. Our pool is now open for class-time use, and there are more opportunities to take learning outdoors. With this in mind, a gentle reminder that hats are helpful at all year levels. Sunscreen is also a great idea — we provide it at intervals, but if students are swimming earlier in the day, starting off sun smart is important. Bringing a water bottle is another good habit at this time of year.

Year 9 and 10 Camp is also fast approaching. We will be heading to Lake Rotoiti, along with Tapawera Area School, for some (hopefully) warmer-weather activities. Last year's camp was held in October and saw our students encamped under tarpaulins, waking up to frozen boots and socks — and even a fresh fall of snow for the Year 10s — what I would describe as "character-building" conditions. (In my defence, it was only one night; the rest of the time was spent snug and warm in the lodge, with hot food and cosy bedding readily available.) The Pelorus Cluster "Top Team" event is scheduled for Thursday 4 December. This is when we welcome the schools from our wider Pelorus community for a day of team building, friendly competition, and plenty of running around. This event simply wouldn't be possible without the support of our community. If you're willing to help, please contact me or the school office and we'll assign you an activity. You're also very welcome to come along and watch — though you may end up getting wet!

Looking towards the end of the year, school will finish on 12 December, with our prizegiving held on the afternoon of Thursday 11 December.

### Year 9 Explore Clay Art at the Suter Art Gallery Nelson

Last month, our Year 9 students were introduced to both functional pottery and artistic clay work during an inspiring visit to the Suter Art Gallery in Nelson.

The Suter Gallery, founded by the Suter family in 1898 under the Suter Art Society Act 1897, officially opened its doors in 1899. Bishop Andrew Burn Suter was a significant figure in Nelson, dedicated to fostering both the arts and the community's cultural life. He and his wife, Amelia, were passionate art lovers, and following Bishop Suter's death, Amelia donated much of their private art collection to help establish the gallery that bears their name.

During the visit, students learned from **Education Team Leader Esther McNaughton** and explored the exhibition Fire and Earth before getting hands-on with clay to create their own unique pieces. The workshop was both fun and educational, allowing students to express their creativity while gaining insight into ceramic art.

To finish the experience, the group enjoyed a well-earned treat at the Suter Gallery Café with its stunning view over the Mahitahi river— sipping smoothies and hot chocolates, whilst conversing about their impressions. A quick trip to Glenduan beach on the way back was much appreciated.

This series is about Nanny Mihi and her grandchildren, often these stories connect with nature and incorporate Māori culture. We were lucky enough to have Melanie read some of these picture books to us, she even shared the inspiration behind the writing of some of these books.

Melanie shared her love for writing with us. Passing on a wealth of knowledge and giving our tamariki simple ways to support their already amazing writing skills. The students played a fun writing game, choosing two new words to incorporate into their story every two minutes. 


Safety for Students is important






