Tumuaki's Report

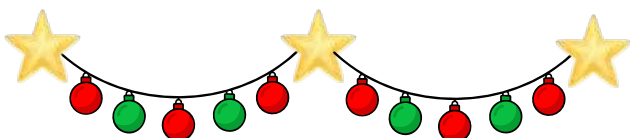


Kia ora Koutou
